

2014 Sailing World Dr Crash

On November 17, 2012, two men left the coast of Mexico for a weekend fishing trip in the open Pacific. That night, a violent storm ambushed them as they were fishing eighty miles offshore. As gale force winds and ten-foot waves pummeled their small, open boat from all sides and nearly capsized them, captain Salvador Alvarenga and his crewmate cut away a two-mile-long fishing line and began a desperate dash through crashing waves as they sought the safety of port. Meanwhile, the Army Air Corps declared Zamperini dead and President Roosevelt sends official condolences to his family, who never gave up hope that he was alive. Somehow, Zamperini survived and he returned home a hero. The celebration was short-lived. He plunged into drinking and brawling and the depths of rage and despair. Nightly, the Bird's face leered at him in his dreams. It would take years, but with the love of his wife and the power of faith, he was able to stop the nightmares and the drinking. After its first Commodore, Walter Fox was elected in 1942, the club was disbanded as members were either called up or volunteered to fight in the Second World War. They returned in 1946/47 as seasoned veterans to raise families. It was these folks and their families that restarted the club and laid the foundation for the wonderful club that we know today. I will take you through the vibrant life that members of the Squadron enjoyed in those days, as they partied at the Lido Beach Casino, dancing, drinking and selecting the Labor Day Regatta Queen, or celebrating the change of watch at the annual Commodore's Ball, held at the Tropicana Night Club, a location which exists today as the Three Senorita's restaurant at 1355 Main Street. We will see how members in the "old days" made their own fund in the small dinghies that they owned as they enjoyed overnight cruising and camping on the mosquito infested spoil banks at the north end of Sarasota Bay near Jewfish Key and the Mar Vista Pub, catching fish for the evening meal and combining their catch into a cast iron pot with potatoes, onions and spices to create a fish stew for all to enjoy. In June 1958, as the city of Sarasota expanded and developed, with plans to demolish the old City Pier, the club was moved to the desolate lands of City Island near the New Pass bridge. The Squadron's only neighbor at the time was WSPB radio station which had begun transmitting from City Island at 7 am on December 7, 1939.

To truly understand the dynamics and magic of the Kennedy family, one must understand their passion for sailing and the sea. Many families sail together, but the Kennedys' relationship with Victura, the 25-foot sloop purchased in 1932, stands apart. Throughout their brief lives, Joe Jr., Jack, and Bobby spent many hours racing Victura. Lack of effort in a race by one of his sons could infuriate Joseph P. Kennedy, and Joe Jr. and Jack ranked among the best collegiate sailors in New England. Likewise, Eunice emerged as a gifted sailor and fierce competitor, the equal of any of her brothers. The Kennedys believed that Jack's experience sailing Victura helped him survive the sinking of his PT boat during World War II. In the 1950s, glossy Life magazine photos of Jack and Jackie on Victura's bow helped define the winning Kennedy brand. Jack doodled sketches of Victura during Oval Office meetings, and it's probable that his love of seafaring played a role in his 1961 decision to put a man on the moon, an enterprise he referred to as "spacefaring." Ted loved Victura as much as any of his siblings did and, with his own children and the children of his lost brothers as crew, he sailed into his old age: past the shoals of an ebbing career, and into his eventual role as the "Lion of the Senate." In Victura, James W. Graham charts the progress of America's signature twentieth-century family dynasty in a narrative both stunningly original and deeply gripping. This true tale of one small sailboat is an invaluable contribution to our understanding of the great story of the Kennedys.
