Maggie and Lee became detectives and learned that Joe and Ali were in Bahrain - an island emirate they'd never heard of. They went there and stole her back. Lawyers and judges took control. Catholic Joe, converted to Islam to win legal custody in Bahrain's Sharia court. Overcoming betrayal by the U.S. Embassy and a hostile attitude toward women, Maggie and Lee escaped from Bahrain with Ali. The child of South Asian migrants, Kazim Ali was born in London, lived as a child in the cities and small towns of Manitoba, and made a life in the United States.
