I suoi due anni saranno scanditi da amori e amicizie, incontri con dissidenti coraggiosi e funzionari allineati, e si concluderanno con l'espulsione dalla Germania Est a seguito della pubblicazione di un libro fortemente critico. Dodici anni dopo, nella nuova Germania unificata, il ragazzo – divenuto il professor Garton Ash di Oxford – si presenta agli archivi della Stasi, la temuta polizia segreta, e apre il dossier che reca il suo nome, ritrovando i suoi due anni berlinesi visti attraverso gli occhi di una piccola parte dei quasi 120.000 tedeschi orientali (uno su 50) che negli anni Ottanta hanno spiato ossessivamente i pochi stranieri e i moltissimi concittadini ritenuti una minaccia per lo Stato. Questa «madeleine avvelenata» permette all'autore di rivisitare la sua esperienza, e lo induce a cercare i «collaboratori non ufficiali» che all'epoca accettarono di riferire le sue mosse alle autorità e i funzionari che di questi delatori come burattinai si servirono. Scoprirà storie di ricatto, la rincorsa di miserabili privilegi, una burocrazia ottusa e paranoica, qualche residua traccia di convinzione ideale: tutto il repertorio della banalità del male in una versione più mediocre e slavata, ma non meno tragica. Documentato come un saggio storiografico, teso come un thriller, profondo come un romanzo di formazione, Il dossier entusiasmerà critici e lettori alla sua uscita nel 1997: vent'anni dopo va riscoperto come un libro indispensabile per fare luce sulle ombre del totalitarismo e della sorveglianza che ancora aleggiano sull'Europa e sul mondo.

Biodiversity, sometimes simply understood as "diversity of species", is a specific quality of life on our planet, the dimensions and importance of which have just lately been fully realized. Today we know that "biological diversity is a global asset of incalculable value to present and future generations" (Kofi Annan). Biodiversity is spread unequally over the world: in fact, the main share of biological resources worldwide is harboured predominantly by the so-called developing countries in the tropics and sub tropics. Therefore, *Biodiversity - A Challenge for Development Research and Policy* was chosen as the title for an international conference which was held in Bonn in 1997 as one of the first major events organized by the then newly established North-South Centre for Development Research (ZEF) at Rheinische Friedrich-Wilhelms-Universität Bonn (Germany). Since the ZEF, founded by the Senate of the University of Bonn in 1995, has played a central role in turning Bonn into a centre for international cooperation and North-South dialogue. The Centre is a product of the Bonn Berlin agreement of July 1994 which was adopted to offset the effects caused by the Parliament and much of the Government moving to Berlin. It fits in well with the double strategy to strengthen Bonn's position as an international science arena and as an eminent place for development policy and the national and supranational agencies dealing with this issue.

For well over two hundred years, Joseph Haydn has been by turns lionized and misrepresented - held up as celebrity, and disparaged as mere forerunner or point of comparison. And yet, unlike many other canonic composers, his music has remained a fixture in the repertoire from his day until ours. What do we need to know now in order to understand

Haydn and his music? With over eighty entries focused on ideas and seven longer thematic essays to bring these together, this distinctive and richly illustrated encyclopedia offers a new perspective on Haydn and the many cultural contexts in which he worked and left his indelible mark during the Enlightenment and beyond. Contributions from sixty-seven scholars and performers in Europe, the Americas, and Oceania, capture the vitality of Haydn studies today - its variety of perspectives and methods - and ultimately inspire further exploration of one of western music's most innovative and influential composers.

A multidecadal cooling is known to have occurred in Europe in the final decades of the sixteenth-century. It is still open to debate as to what might have caused the underlying shifts in atmospheric circulation and how these changes affected societies. This book is the fruit of interdisciplinary cooperation among 37 scientists including climatologists, hydrologists, glaciologists, dendroclimatologists, and economic and cultural historians. The known documentary climatic evidence from six European countries is compared to results of tree-ring studies. Seasonal temperature and precipitation are estimated from this data and monthly mean surface pressure patterns in the European area are reconstructed for outstanding anomalies. Results are compared to fluctuations of Alpine glaciers and to changes in the frequency of severe floods and coastal storms. Moreover, the impact of climate change on grain prices and wine production is assessed. Finally, it is convincingly argued that witches at that time were burnt as scapegoats for climatic change.

l'opera dell'autore tedesco e che in questo libro si concretizzano nella claustrofobica e velenosa "Locanda della Trinità". In the 1930s translation became a key issue in the cultural politics of the Fascist regime due to the fact that Italy was publishing more translations than any other country in the world. Making use of extensive archival research, the author of this new study examines this 'invasion of translations' through a detailed statistical analysis of the translation market. The book shows how translations appeared to challenge official claims about the birth of a Fascist culture and cast Italy in a receptive role that did not tally with Fascist notions of a dominant culture extending its influence abroad. The author shows further that the commercial impact of this invasion provoked a sustained reaction against translated popular literature on the part of those writers and intellectuals who felt threatened by its success. He examines the aggressive campaign that was conducted against the Italian Publishers Federation by the Authors and Writers Union (led by the Futurist poet F. T. Marinetti), accusing them of favouring their private profit over the national interest. Finally, the author traces the evolution of Fascist censorship, showing how the regime developed a gradually more repressive policy towards translations as notions of cultural purity began to influence the perception of imported literature.

Nessuna croce manca è la storia di tutte le sconfitte che ancora bruciano sulla pelle di una generazione. Una generazione sbagliata e sempre perdente, fatta di giovanissimi reduci già disillusi da ogni cosa. «Scriviamo volantini e facciamo casini per battaglie così lontane che nemmeno la scoreggia dei nostri urli arriva a destinazione, lo sai questo, sì? Ne sei consapevole? Mi chiedo se non facciamo politica per dare soddisfazione a noi stessi e basta.»

After having been kept in bondage for 12 years in Louisiana by various masters, Northup was able to write to friends and family in New York, who were in turn able to secure his release. Northup's account provides extensive details on the slave markets

in Washington, D.C. and New Orleans and describes at length cotton and sugar cultivation on major plantations in Louisiana. A Children's Book About Beer?
