Diplomarbeit aus dem Jahr 2003 im Fachbereich Sport - Sportökonomie, Sportmanagement, Note: Gut, Universität Wien (Institut für Sportwissenschaft), 91 Quellen im Literaturverzeichnis, Sprache: Deutsch, Abstract: Die Vergabe der Olympischen Spiele 1996 an Atlanta hat viele Diskussionen zum Thema Kommerzialisierung im Sport und insbesondere bei Olympischen Spielen ausgelöst. Der sentimentale Favorit Athen konnte sich in der Bewerbung als Austragungsort der Jahrhundertspiele gegen die "Coca-Cola-Stadt" im Süd-Osten der USA nicht durchsetzen. Athen galt deshalb als die Bewerberstadt mit den größten Chancen, da die griechische Hauptstadt genau Hundert Jahre zuvor (1896) die ersten Spiele der Neuzeit ausgerichtet hat. Es wäre also ein rundes Jubiläum gewesen. Tatsache ist aber, dass Atlanta mit der Veranstaltung der 23. Olympischen Spiele beauftragt wurde. Es wird vermutet, dass wirtschaftliche Überlegungen der Hauptgrund für diese unpopuläre Entscheidung des Internationalen Olympischen Komitees (IOC) waren. Der Begriff Kommerzialisierung ist hier sicherlich angebracht. Der Verlag F.A. Brockhaus (2003) definiert in seinem Wörterbuch *Der Grosse Brockhaus* dieses Wort folgendermaßen: "Unterordnung von kulturellen Werten unter wirtschaftliche Interessen." (S.562). Eine Aufgabe dieser Arbeit ist es, die Verflechtung zwischen Wirtschaft und Sport unter Berücksichtigung der Olympischen Spiele näher zu beleuchten. Die wichtigste Fragestellung bezieht sich dabei auf den Zeitpunkt (Zeitraum), mit dem die Kommerzialisierung der olympischen Bewegung begonnen hat. Ab wann kann man von der Kommerzialisierung der Olympischen Spiele sprechen? Ein zweiter Aspekt dieser Arbeit beschäftigt sich mit Schlüsselpersonen und Schlüsselereignissen des Phänomens der Vermarktung der Olympischen Spiele. Both Jesse Owens and Adolf Hitler grew up in poverty, and each of the two men struggled to find their footing later in life. Owens represented the United States in the 1936 Olympics, after which he found it difficult to sustain a well-paying job. In turn, Adolf Hitler moved to Vienna as a teenager, following his parents' death, but he never found the financial success he so desperately craved as an artist. He spent most of his time in the city a penniless, unemployed young man. The similarities between the two men end there. While Adolf Hitler became angered and enraged by his circumstances, and by the fate of Germany following the First World War, Jesse Owens went out of his way to help people. Even when he faced the cruelty of racism in the United States, Owens saw the best in others. He spent most of his days working with children and teenagers, making a conscious effort to give them the guidance and support they needed to enact positive change in the world. In contrast, Hitler turned to hatred, divisiveness, and conflict in his attempts to change the world in his image. Even when others asked him to denounce the racist tendencies of Adolf Hitler, he chose to grudgingly respect the German leader. Die Sonne war bereits hinter dem Horizont verschwunden, als sich am 16. August 1936 die Abschlussfeier der XI. Olympischen Spiele im Berliner Olympia-Stadion dem Ende neigte. Auf den Rängen des Stadions erhoben sich 100.000 Menschen um Hand in Hand das 100 Jahre alte deutsche Volkslied "Spiele sind aus" zu singen. Zur selben Zeit wurden die Fahnen aller teilnehmenden Nationen langsam von den Masten eingeholt. Als aus dem weiten Rund eine Stimme erschallte: "Achtung! During his youth, his family moved between a variety of Texan boomtowns, and Howard – a bookish and somewhat introverted child – was steeped in the violent myths and legends of the Old South. At fifteen Howard began to read the pulp magazines of the day, and to write more seriously. The December 1922 issue of his high school newspaper featured two of his stories, 'Golden Hope Christmas' and 'West is West'. In 1924 he sold his first piece – a short caveman tale titled 'Spear and Fang' – for \$16 to the not-yet-famous Weird Tales magazine. Howard's most famous character, Conan the Cimmerian, was a barbarian-turned-King during the Hyborian Age, a mythical period of some 12,000 years ago. Conan featured in seventeen Weird Tales stories between 1933 and 1936 which is why Howard is now regarded as having spawned the 'sword and sorcery' genre. The Conan stories have since been adapted many times, most famously in the series of films starring Arnold Schwarzenegger.
