An Economist Book of the Year, 2001. In the 18th century, a debate ensued over the French naturalist Buffon's contention that the New World was in fact geologically new. Historians, naturalists, and philosophers clashed over Buffon's view. This book maintains that the "dispute" was also a debate over historical authority: upon whose sources and facts should naturalists and historians reconstruct the history of the New World and its people. In addressing this question, the author offers a strikingly novel interpretation of the Enlightenment.

Island in the Light / Isla en la luz is a fascinating and insightful compilation that pairs contemporary Cuban visual art and literature by having 30 prominent writers respond to the

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works of 35 renowned artists. Contemporary Cuban art, literature, and music come together in *Island in the Light / Isla en la luz*. This bilingual compilation of the work of 35 artists and 30 writers began by selecting artwork by renowned artists and asking prominent writers to create original stories, poems, or essays in response. The result is a thoroughly original and captivating selection of visual arts and literature in dialogue that conveys a sense of the essence and energy of Cuban arts today. Artists represented include Tania Bruguera, Maria Magdalena Campos-Pons, Yoan Capote, Teresita Fernández, Roberto Fabelo, Carlos Garaicoa, and Enrique Martínez Celaya. Among the writers are Wendy Guerra, José Kozler, Jorge Enrique Lage, Legna Rodríguez Iglesias, Achy Obejas, Leonardo Padura, and Reina María Rodríguez. The works are drawn from the Jorge M. Pérez Art Collection; the majority have been gifted to the Pérez Art Museum Miami (PAMM), while the others are promised gifts to PAMM. The volume also includes music: Pavel Urkiza composed original scores inspired by several of the selections that readers link to through QR codes. In addition to the short stories, poems, and essays inspired by the artwork, the volume includes commentary and critical essays by Jorge M. Pérez, Carlos Garaicoa, and Wendy Guerra and Leonardo Padura. Proceeds benefit The Jorge M. Pérez Family Foundation, which will redirect the funds to arts organizations.

The events and processes that have taken place in the last decade in South America have given way to one of the most interesting regional phenomena under a global crisis and within a changing world order. From the traditional status of Washington's backyard and reign of economic and political stability, South America has increasingly turned into a region marked by a heterodox development in the light of other dominant regional tendencies of development-the

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European Union, NAFTA and the Asia Pacific. The political economic nature of the new South American regionalism (NSAR) is far from echoing the dominant interpretations about it, which reflects the major regional projects today. Given the reach and scope of the existing literature on the topic of the NSAR, there is an important gap concerning its academic exploration in relation to its nature of development, political economic complexity, challenges and orientations. In this sense, this book explores, from a wider and pluralist political economic perspective, the developmental dimensions of the NSAR within a changing hemispheric and world order in transformation. It analyses a set of specific debates: regionalism in the Americas then and now; social and economic development and regional integration; and organized crime, intelligence and defence. An in depth and critical reflection on the complex and heterogeneous path of regionalization taking place in South America from different perspectives and in key issues of regional development.

This book focuses on the life and artistic activities of Emilio Sanchez (1921–1999) in New York, and Latin America in the 1940s and 1950s. More specifically, the book will consider Sanchez in the wider context of mid-century Cuban artists, and cross-cultural exchange between New York, Cuba, and the Caribbean. The book reflects on why Sanchez chose to be a mobile observer of the American and Caribbean vernacular at a time when such an approach seemed at odds with the mainstream avant-garde. The

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book includes a foreword by Dr. Ann Koll, former Executive Director/Curator of the Emilio Sanchez Foundation, and an introduction by Dr. Nathan J. Timpano, University of Miami Department of Art and Art History. This book will be of interest to scholars in modern art, Caribbean studies, architectural history, and Latin American and Hispanic studies.

La revista Cuenco, luego Alcor, es probablemente una de las revistas culturales más importantes del Paraguay en la segunda mitad del siglo XX, tiempo sumamente conmocionado por diversos eventos sociales, tanto en el Paraguay como en el resto del Mundo. Publicada entre 1955 y 1969, fue la más internacional de todas las publicaciones periódicas del Paraguay. Fue fundada por el célebre escritor paraguayo Rubén Bareiro Saguier y el no menos importante actor cultural Julio César Troche. Los 47 números de esta revista están analizados e indizados en esta obra.

Presented at the 1st International Conference on Urban Growth and the Circular Economy that was held in Alicante, Spain the papers included in this book focus on the continuing and rapid growth of cities and their regions of influence and how that has led to the need to find new solutions which allow for promoting their sustainable development. The quest for the Sustainable City has until recently focused on the efficient use of resources with the application of technical advances giving rise to the definition of SMART Cities. The economic model emphasised however is still “linear” in the sense that the design and consumption follows the pattern of extraction of natural

resources, manufacturing, product usage and waste disposal. The continuous growth of urban population has recently given rise to the emergence of a new model which responds better to the challenges of natural resource depletion as well as waste management. This model has been called the “circular economy”. The circular economy is a recent concept based on the reuse of what up to now has been considered wastes, reintroducing them into the productive cycle. The objective of the circular economy is to reduce consumption and achieve savings in terms of raw materials, water and energy, thus contributing to the preservation of resources in order to reach sustainable development. One of the most important of these resources is water which is becoming a scarce commodity in an ever expanding world whose population demands a better standard of living. Water is required for agricultural purposes as well as by industry, in addition to its use by the general population. The recycling of water is an essential component of the circular economy. There is no possibility for the success of a long term economic policy without addressing the problems of natural resources and environmental pollution, which will affect the reuse of materials and products. The current market economy based on a linear model from resource extraction, manufacturing, consumption and waste disposal, has not proved a long term suitable solution, in spite of the substantial efforts made in reducing its environmental impacts. This is largely due to the continuous population growth, in a society that demands high standards of living, thus requiring an ever increasing share

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of natural resources.

La biografía de Pío Baroja, una vida fecunda. Pío Baroja fue, sin duda, uno de los máximos escritores del siglo XX español. También es uno de los más leídos, hasta el punto que el adjetivo «barojiano» como forma de entender la escritura tiene una irrecusable y expresiva entidad. Y, sin embargo, es uno de los menos estudiados, si se le compara con Unamuno, Machado y Valle-Inclán, e incluso con su amigo Azorín. La presente biografía reúne los datos de una vida que ha sido contada otras veces y que el mismo Baroja narró en dos de sus momentos: al pasar la cuarentena y al entrar en la setentena. Pero, más allá de datos, anécdotas y conjeturas, este libro ha pretendido una interpretación coherente cuyos centros de referencia son la naturaleza de la imaginación barojiana y su concepción del oficio de escritor. Por ello, se han tomado en cuenta, de modo preferente, el escenario vital -los hogares familiares- y su permanente diálogo con la realidad española y europea -ideas, viajes, lecturas-, a la vez que la opinión de sus contemporáneos, que lo leyeron con apasionamiento, y,

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sobre todo, la constitución de un público de «barojianos» que dejó una intensa huella recíproca en la obra del autor. Porque, junto con Unamuno, Baroja ha sido el escritor español que más intensamente sintió la necesidad de dialogar con sus lectores.

The National Museum in Denmark possesses a large number of vessels from Argentina. Very few people knew about the existence of archaeological material from Argentina at the National Museum. And none had ever investigated these materials; neither have there been any previous studies of Argentinian Archaeology in Denmark. Since 2003, the Ethnographic institutions in Stockholm and Göteborg were contacted to enlarge the knowledge of Argentinian Archaeology, as they have large collections of Argentinian artefacts. In Denmark, there are no institutions focusing on this subject. The investigation of the following material was presented at several international congresses in Denmark, Sweden and Argentina, and now culminate in the cataloguing of the archaeological material located at the National Museum in Denmark, providing a spectrum of Argentinian Archaeology.

Su prensa fue en el siglo XIX una pieza clave en la construcción de esas comunidades imaginarias que fueron sus Estados nacionales. De aquella prensa nacieron primero las revistas del romanticismo, más adelante las del movimiento modernista y luego los magazines populares. En el siglo XX conquistaron la escena las

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revistas vanguardistas y a su turno llegaron las izquierdistas, las universitarias, las feministas, las antifascistas, las antiimperialistas, las literarias... configurando todo un universo revisteril que venía a proponer y a responder a las demandas de un público lector creciente y diversificado. De lo "culto" a lo "popular", de la literatura y las bellas artes a la política, de los cenáculos masculinos a la irrupción de las mujeres en la esfera pública, del mundo adulto a la emergencia de la juventud, de la cultura letrada a la cultura de la imagen y del papel impreso a la pantalla, nuestras revistas han recorrido un siglo y medio de vida intensa. América Latina en sus revistas quiere recoger los estudios que desde las más diversas perspectivas están dando cuenta de esta dimensión fascinante del mundo de lo impreso. En este primer libro de la serie, Horacio Tarcus reconstruye el proceso por el cual las revistas culturales latinoamericanas dejaron de ser meros reservorios de donde exhumar los textos juveniles o marginales de los grandes escritores, para pasar a ser reconocidas y revalorizadas como actores colectivos que jugaron un rol relevante en la construcción de las tramas culturales latinoamericanas. Inscripta en el "giro material" que ha tomado en los últimas décadas la historia intelectual, la presente obra invita al lector a recorrer los procesos que impulsaron el estudio de las revistas desde la dimensión textual a la material, de la producción a la recepción, de lo individual a lo colectivo, de lo "alto" a lo "bajo", de la cultura letrada a la cultura plebeya, de lo nacional a lo continental y lo internacional, de lo sustancial a lo relacional y de lo autoral a lo reticular. 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tiempo, ofrece un repertorio de estrategias y herramientas conceptuales a todos los interesados en descifrar los códigos del universo revisteril.

Pío Baroja (Colección Españoles Eminentes)TAURUS

In this account of the naval aspect of Hernando Cortés's invasion of the Aztec Empire, C. Harvey Gardiner has added another dimension to the drama of Spanish conquest of the New World and to Cortés himself as a military strategist. The use of ships, in the climactic moment of the Spanish-Aztec clash, which brought about the fall of Tenochtitlán and consequently of all of Mexico, though discussed briefly in former English-language accounts of the struggle, had never before been detailed and brought into a perspective that reveals its true significance. Gardiner, on the basis of previously unexploited sixteenth-century source materials, has written a historical revision that is as colorful as it is authoritative. Four centuries before the term was coined, Cortés, in the key years of 1520–1521, used the technique of "total war." He was able to do so victoriously primarily because of his courage in taking a gamble and his brilliance in tactical planning, but these qualities might well have signified nothing without the fortunate presence in his forces of a master shipwright, Martin López. As the exciting story unrolls, Cortés, López, and the many other participants in the venture of creating and using a navy in the midst of the New World mountains and forests are seen as real personalities, not embalmed historical stereotypes, and the indigenous defenders are revealed as complex human beings facing huge odds. Much of the tale is told in the

actual words of the protagonists; Gardiner has probed letters, court records, and other contemporary documents. He has also compared this naval feat of the Spaniards with other maritime events from ancient times to the present. *Naval Power in the Conquest of Mexico* as a book was itself the result of an interesting combination of circumstances. C. Harvey Gardiner, as teacher, scholar, and writer, had long been interested in Latin American history generally and Mexican history in particular. During World War II, from 1942 to 1946, he served with the U.S. Navy. As he relates: "One day in early autumn 1945, while loafing on the bow of a naval vessel knifing its way southward in the Pacific a few degrees north of the Equator, my thoughts turned to the naval side of the just-ended conflict, and in time the question emerged, 'I wonder how the little ships and the little men will fare in the eventual record?' Then, because I was eager to return to my civilian life of pursuit of Latin American themes, the concomitant question came: 'I wonder what little fighting ships and minor men of early Latin America have been consigned to the oblivion of historical neglect?' As I began later to rummage my way from Columbus toward modern times, I seized upon the Mexican Conquest as the prime period with pay dirt for the researcher in quest of the answer to that latter question."

La colección: auge y consolidación de un objeto editorial estudia la colección —fenómeno editorial esencial— por medio de una compilación de estudios de caso que dibujan un mapa para dar una idea de la trascendencia de la colección editorial en la

educación literaria y científica y en la formación del lector moderno. Es un diálogo comparativo entre los casos, tomados de distintas épocas y diferentes geografías, que examina el papel que desempeñan los diferentes actores involucrados en el proceso de creación y de difusión, tanto en cuestiones materiales y económicas como en la estructuración del conocimiento. Así, permite un interesante cruce entre las políticas culturales (editoriales) y la definición de los cánones nacionales. Como se afirma en la introducción, «la colección es a la vez “artefacto material y hecho de sociedad”».

El trabajo presentado como Tesis Doctoral se propone un examen pormenorizado de la historia del Museo Nacional de Bellas Artes de La Habana y su colección de retratos de la pintura española del siglo XIX. Esta institución atesora una importante colección de pintura europea de ese período y, particularmente la pintura española decimonónica destaca por el gran volumen y el valor de sus piezas. Así, analizamos los retratos ejecutados por artistas de la talla de Vicente López Portaña (1772-1850), José de Madrazo y Agudo (1781-1859), José Gutiérrez de la Vega (1791-1865), Antonio María Esquivel y Suárez de Urbina (1806-1857), Federico de Madrazo y Küntz (1815-1894), Dióscoro Teófilo Puebla Tolín (1831-1901), Vicente Palmaroli González (1834-1896), Mariano Fortuny Marsal (1838-1874), Raimundo de Madrazo y Garreta (1841-1920), Ulpiano Fernández-Checa y Saiz (1860-1916), Joaquín Sorolla y Bastida (1863-1923), Hermenegildo Anglada Camarasa (1871-1959), etc. También exploramos el interés de las familias adineradas cubanas por los encargos de ese género pictórico dirigidos a

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los más prestigiosos artistas ibéricos de la centuria, las huellas de las élites criollas dentro del sistema colonial español y sus vínculos con la oligarquía metropolitana, que evidencian las estrechas relaciones entre las expresiones artísticas y los símbolos de poder.

Puerto Ricans maintain a vibrant identity that bridges two very different places--the island of Puerto Rico and the U.S. mainland. Whether they live on the island, in the States, or divide time between the two, most imagine Puerto Rico as a separate nation and view themselves primarily as Puerto Rican. At the same time, Puerto Ricans have been U.S. citizens since 1917, and Puerto Rico has been a U.S. commonwealth since 1952. Jorge Duany uses previously untapped primary sources to bring new insights to questions of Puerto Rican identity, nationalism, and migration. Drawing a distinction between political and cultural nationalism, Duany argues that the Puerto Rican "nation" must be understood as a new kind of translocal entity with deep cultural continuities. He documents a strong sharing of culture between island and mainland, with diasporic communities tightly linked to island life by a steady circular migration. Duany explores the Puerto Rican sense of nationhood by looking at cultural representations produced by Puerto Ricans and considering how others--American anthropologists, photographers, and museum curators, for example--have represented the nation. His sources of information include ethnographic fieldwork, archival research, interviews, surveys, censuses, newspaper articles, personal documents, and literary texts.

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
