To explore variables associated with the completion and non-completion of an in-home emergency crisis intervention among children and adolescent in two Connecticut catchment areas, 450 cases from the year 2003 were used for this study from a large community mental health agency in central Connecticut. The results showed that prior psychiatric hospitalization, higher levels of reported poverty and being prescribed medication were associated with completion of the program. In addition, results also showed that children who have caretakers with mental illness were less likely to complete the program.
