'WHO DO YOU think you are kidding Mr Hitler?' Not Colonel Rodney Foster, a platoon commander of the Kent Home Guard. Dad's Army, the iconic comedy series is as well-known today as it was forty years ago. But the reality of life in the Home Guard was often very different. Here, for the first time, is the full inside story of the Home Guard, the ragtag volunteer army that defended the coast of Britain from German invasion during the Second World War. The creators have volunteered to open their archives, which include the original programme research, annotated scripts and location photographs. Now recognised as

one of the great shows of this and any TV era, Perry and Croft have decided the programme requires a monument and this book will be it.
