Einen weiteren Bereich der Literatur, in den Das Boot aufgrund seiner speziellen Thematik fällt, stellt die sog. ‚U-Boot-Literatur‘ dar. Die Bandbreite ist enorm. Sie reicht von historiographischen und technisch-wissenschaftlichen Arbeiten (maritimer Fachliteratur) bis zu populärwissenschaftlichen Büchern und erstreckt sich bis in die ‚Niederungen‘ der sog. ‚Landserhefte‘. Die Bedeutung von Buchheims Boot für diesen Literaturbereich wird ein wesentlicher Aspekt dieser Arbeit sein. Zunächst soll in einem knappen Exkurs die Frage geklärt werden, ob Das Boot als erster Teil einer angeblichen Trilogie, gewissermaßen isoliert von den anderen beiden Teilen, untersucht werden kann. Dann soll kurz auf die grundsätzlichen Probleme bei der Kategorisierung in Kriegsliteratur bzw. Anti-Kriegsliteratur eingegangen werden. In einem nächsten Schritt wird Das Boot dann mit der Kriegsprosa nach 1945 in Zusammenhang gebracht. Dazu sollen Motive, Hauptströmungen und Kontinuitäten innerhalb dieses thematischen Teilbereichs herausgestellt und der Roman auf Entsprechungen bzw. Divergenzen untersucht werden. In diesem Rahmen wird auch auf die wesentlichen Unterschiede der west- und ostdeutschen Kriegsprosa in dieser durch den Systemgegensatz, den ‚Kalten Krieg‘, geprägten Ära eingegangen werden. Außerdem sollen die Hauptkritikpunkte, mit denen sich Das Boot immer wieder konfrontiert sieht, erörtert werden. Ein weiteres Kapitel wird sich mit der Gattungsfrage des Romans beschäftigen, die bislang in der Forschung noch nicht hinreichend beantwortet wurde. Der Fokus wird sich dabei auf dokumentarische Literatur im weiteren und den ‚Dokumentarroman‘ im engeren Sinne richten. Der letzte Abschnitt beschäftigt sich dann mit der Stellung, die Das Boot innerhalb der U-Boot-Literatur einnimmt. Dabei soll neben der heftigen Debatte, die der Roman auslöste, auch beleuchtet werden, inwieweit das Werk Buchheims im Schatten seines Autors bzw. dessen Ruf steht.

Meanwhile, Inspector Émile Brunfaut attempts to solve a gritty murder being suppressed at the highest level; Matek, a Polish hitman who regrets having never become a priest, scrambles after taking out the wrong man; and outraged pig farmers protest trade restrictions as a brave escapee squeals through the streets. These narratives and more are masterfully woven, revealing the absurdities—and real dangers—of a fracturing Europe. A tour de force from one of Austria's most esteemed novelists, *The Capital* is a mordantly funny and piercingly urgent saga of the European Union, and an aerial feat of sublime world literature.

Captain Karl von Schenk of the Kaiser's Navy is a stereotypical German nobleman - supremely self-confident, touchy about the divisions of class and any infringement on his place. His wartime service related in his diary is a series of triumphs over harrowing circumstances, bringing his boat back in spite of the best efforts of the Royal Navy to stop him. His one vulnerability is a young lady he meets on leave in Bruges, Belgium. Although she is the trophy girlfriend of a German colonel who could cause him much harm if he were to find out, von Schenk pursues his Zoe with Teutonic straightforwardness. And both he and the reader are entirely blind-sided by the unexpected thunderclap that puts an end to the sweet affair. Stephen King-Hall, a Royal Navy officer during the war and writing as "Etienne", penned this book as if he had simply discovered it on a surrendered submarine. In fact, some editions of the book list the author as "anonymous." King-Hall's knowledge of naval affairs lend authority to this yarn of men that go to the sea in ships that sink... on purpose.

This study investigates the relationship between Lothar-Günther Buchheim (1918-2007), his bestselling 1973 novel *Das Boot* (*The Boat*), and West Germany's *Vergangenheitsbewältigung*. As a war reporter during the Battle of the Atlantic, Buchheim benefitted from distinct privileges, yet he was never in a position of power. Almost thirty years later, Buchheim confronted the duality of his own past and railed against what he perceived to be a varnished public memory of the submarine campaign. Michael Rothberg's theory of the implicated beneficiary is used as a lens to view Buchheim and this duality. *Das Boot* has been retold by others worldwide because many people claim that the story bears an anti-war message. Wolfgang Petersen's critically acclaimed 1981 film and interpretations as a comedy sketch, a theatrical play, and a streamed television sequel have followed. This trajectory of Buchheim's personal memory reflects a

process that practitioners of memory studies have described as transnational memory formation. Archival footage, interviews, and teaching materials reflect the relevance of *Das Boot* since its debut. Given the debates that surrounded Buchheim's endeavors, the question now raised is whether Germany's "mastering the past" serves as a model for other societies analyzing their own histories. With the international success of the classic film *Das Boot*, U-96 is arguably the most famous of all German U-boats. Here is the true story of U-96, and its legendary commander Heinrich Lehmann-Willenbrock. In continuous combat from September 1940 to March 1945, follow the crew of U-96 from their bases in Kiel, Germany, as well as Lorient and St. Nazaire on the west coast of France, to intense combat against Allied shipping. It is populated with poor people who desire nothing more than to be rich, rich people whose only concern is to keep up with their neighbors and not be associated with the "wrong element," and elements of both who care far more about appearances than reality. It offers further evidence that the world may be very different from 100 years ago, but the people in it are very much the same.
