When work began on the first volume of this text in 1992, the science of distribution management was still very much a backwater of general management and academic thought. While most of the body of knowledge associated with calculating EOQs, fair-shares inventory deployment, productivity curves, and other operations management techniques had long been solidly established, new thinking about distribution management had taken a definite back-seat to the then dominant interest in Lean thinking, quality management, and business process reengineering and their impact on manufacturing and service organizations. For the most part, discussion relating to the distribution function centered on a fairly recent concept called Logistics Management. But, despite talk of how logistics could be used to integrate internal and external business functions and even be considered a source of competitive advantage on its own, most of the focus remained on how companies could utilize operations management techniques to optimize the traditional day-to-day shipping and

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receiving functions in order to achieve cost containment and customer fulfillment objectives. In the end, distribution management was, for the most part, still considered a dreary science, concerned with transportation rates and cost trade-offs. expediting and the tedious calculus Today, the science of distribution has become perhaps one of the most important and exciting disciplines in the management of business.

This paper treats a two-echelon inventory system. The higher echelon is a single location referred to as the depot, which places orders for supply of a single commodity. The lower echelon consists of several points, called the retailers, which are supplied by shipments from the depot, and at which random demands for the item occur. Stocks are reviewed and decisions are made periodically. Orders and/or shipments may each require a fixed lead time before reaching their respective destinations. Section II gives a short literature review of distribution research. Section III introduces the multi-echelon distribution system together with the underlying assumptions and gives a description of how this problem can be viewed as a Markovian Decision Process. Section IV discusses the concept of cost modifications in a distribution context. Section V presents the test-examples together with their optimal solutions and also gives the characteristic properties of these optimal solutions. These properties then will be used in section VI to give adapted versions of various heuristics which were used in assembly experiments previously and which will be tested against the test-examples.
