"J. Brent Crosson's Experiments with Power opens in Trinidad in 2011 with the declaration of a state of emergency. In describing their own justice-making practices as work, science, and experiments with power, obeah practitioners challenge the moral and racial foundations of the Western category of religion and offer a way of reframing religious practice as a critique of the exclusionary limits of religion in modernity"--
