Alessandro Portelli è considerato uno dei padri fondatori della storia orale non solo italiana ma internazionale. Deve tale fama al paziente accumulo di decenni di viaggi e interviste a cavallo dei continenti ai protagonisti della storia non ufficiale, quella fatta attraverso le voci dei testimoni diretti di grandi eventi che hanno segnato epoche e svolte culturali. In questo volume – che ha avuto una diffusione di culto tra gli appassionati del genere e che oggi viene ripresentato in una nuova edizione con una prefazione dell'autore – i saggi di Portelli vengono raccolti in una sorta di canone. Nell'ultimo quarto di secolo essi hanno contribuito a trasformare il metodo, gli obiettivi, le finalità stesse della storia orale, diventando riferimenti obbligati in ambito internazionale. La storia orale ricostruisce gli eventi del passato, soprattutto del mondo popolare e non egemone, e ne esplora il significato, attraverso l'analisi del racconto, l'immaginazione, il desiderio, il sogno, la soggettività – e attraverso il dialogo fra culture e persone, intervistati e intervistatori, ricercatori e narratori. La storia orale si intreccia con la letteratura, la linguistica, l'antropologia, le religioni, la musica, la cultura di massa – e la politica. Ecco perché i saggi di Portelli percorrono un tempo che va dalle stragi naziste e dai bombardamenti della seconda guerra mondiale all'impatto della globalizzazione sul mondo operaio e agli eventi del G8 di Genova, e uno spazio che va dalle acciaierie di Terni al Kentucky, da Roma all'India,

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passando per il Brasile o per il Vietnam. Partendo da eventi puntuali e da luoghi definiti, essi elaborano proposte generali di teoria e di metodo. A tenerli insieme è una immutata passione, un unico stile, e una insaziabile curiosità che contagia il lettore pagina dopo pagina.

This issue is the first milestone on the way to the XXth AIDP World Congress dedica-ted to 'Criminal Justice and Corporate Business'. It brings together key proceedings of the International Colloquium on 'Food Regulation and Criminal Justice', organised by the Chinese group of the AIPD in Beijing on September 23rd-26th, 2016. The volume contains the resolutions adopted in Beijing, the general report, four transversal articles, and several national reports. It offers a broad overview of the main challenges raised by contemporary food regulation, as well as various responses provided by criminal law around the globe. History in our day is still a story, and yet one from which we expect to tell the truth - not just the facts, the names and events of the past, but the invisible order and forces behind them. How can the language of history balance these seemingly contrary tasks - the narrative, the scientific, and the political? This is the question Jacques Ranciere explores in "The names of history", a meditation on the poetics of historical knowledge. In the works of writers from Jules Michelet to Fernand Braudel, Ranciere traces an ongoing revolution in historical study, a movement that challenged, in the practice of language, the opposition of science and literature. By way of a commentary on Erich Auerbach, he shows how fictional narrative intertwines with historical narrative to produce a "truth" that retains mythical elements. The poetics of knowledge Ranciere develops here is an attempt to

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identify the literary procedures by which historical discourse escapes literature and gives itself the status of a science. His book is also an appreciation of Braudel, whose work in the Annales school greatly advanced this project. Ranciere follows and extends Braudel's discursive production of new agencies of history, which accounts for both the material conditions in which history takes place and the language in which it is written.

In 2008, Silvio Berlusconi returned to power - thanks to a decisive electoral victory - to head a slimmer coalition whose cabinet consisted of members very close to him. The year began with the garbage crisis in Naples and ended in a climate dominated by economic uncertainty. In between some unexpected events happened: during the administrative elections, held with the general elections in April, the right in Rome claimed many victories; for the first time ever, a woman, Emma Marcegaglia, was elected President of Confindustria; and the Alitalia airline had to be rescued from the brink of economic collapse. For consecutive months, opinion polls gave Berlusconi an unprecedented level of popular support; those polled attributed their approval to either his 'decisionism' or to what they viewed as a successful strategy of continual announcements. Others pointed to the executive's success in 'governing the fears' of Italians, which was helped by a change of register in the way the media dealt with issues of security. This volume shows that the politics of vetoes, which characterised the previous center-left government, could not conceal the structural, economic and social problems that still need to be resolved, a situation not helped by the fact that the

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opposition parties were still unable to develop an effective political strategy by yearend. With the contribution of Italian and international experts, the volume also addresses the issues of the difficult integration of immigrants, the mismanagement of public health and the reform of the education.

In 1900, Sheffield was the tenth largest city in the world. Cutlery "made in Sheffield" was used across the globe, and the city built armored plate for the navy in the run-up to the First World War. Today, however, Sheffield's derelict Victorian shop floors and industrial buildings are hidden behind new leisure developments and shopping centers. Based on an extended period of research in two local steel factories, this book combines a lively, descriptive account with a wide-ranging critique of post-industrial capitalism. Its central argument is that recent government attempts to engineer Britain's transition to a post-industrial and classless society have instead created volatile post-industrial spaces marked by informal labor, industrial sweatshops and levels of risk and deprivation that divide citizens along lines of gender, age, and class. The author discovers a link between production and reproduction, and demonstrates the centrality of kinship relations, child and female labor, and intra-household exchanges to the economic process of de-industrialization. Paradoxically, government policies have reinvigorated working-class militancy, spawned local industrial clusters and re-embedded the economy in the spatial and social structure of the neighborhood. "Using examples from architecture, film, literature, and the visual arts, this wide-ranging book examines the

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place and significance of New York City in the urban imaginary between 1890 and 1940. In particular, *Imagining New York City* considers how and why certain city spaces--such as the skyline, the sidewalk, the slum, and the subway--have come to emblemize key aspects of the modern urban condition. In so doing, the book also considers the ways in which cultural developments in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries set the stage for more recent responses to a variety of urban challenges facing the city, such as post-disaster recovery, the renewal of urban infrastructure, and the remaking of public space"--

A study of class and inequality from an anthropological perspective, bringing together an international team of researchers.

This second edition of *Historical Dictionary of Italian Cinema* contains a chronology, an introduction, and an extensive bibliography. The dictionary section has over 400 cross-referenced entries on major movements, directors, actors, actresses, film genres, producers, industry organizations and key films.

On March 24, 1944, Nazi occupation forces in Rome killed 335 unarmed civilians in retaliation for a partisan attack the day before. Portelli has crafted an eloquent, multi-voiced oral history of the massacre, of its background and its aftermath. The moving stories of the victims, the women and children who survived and carried on, the partisans who fought the Nazis, and the common people who lived through the tragedies of the war together paint a many-hued portrait of one of the world's most richly historical cities. *The Order Has Been*

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Carried Out powerfully relates the struggles for freedom under Fascism and Nazism, the battles for memory in post-war democracy, and the meanings of death and grief in modern society.

In ihrer Untersuchung ausgewählter Werke von Christian Raimo, Tommaso Pincio, Nicola Lagioia, Michela Murgia, Andrea Bajani, Sebastiano Nata und Luca Ricci arbeitet die Autorin Motive, Figurenkonzeptionen sowie Gestaltungsmittel heraus, mit denen entfremdete Arbeitsbedingungen sowie Bewusstseinsformen literarisch dargestellt werden. Geprüft wird ebenfalls, inwieweit Entfremdungskritik geübt und über die Möglichkeiten einer Überwindung von Entfremdung nachgedacht wird. Mit der Analyse eines Romans von Philipp Schönthaler wirft die Autorin auch einen Blick auf zeitgenössische deutschsprachige Arbeitsrepräsentationen. Starting out from Marx's theory of alienated work, the ideology critique of the Frankfurt School, Sartre's concept of mauvaise-foi, and more recent alienation theories, the present work investigates new and old forms of alienation in the working world of the 21st century, which has become a central subject especially in Italian Contemporary literature. Cora Rok examines selected novels and short stories by Christian Raimo, Tommaso

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Pincio, Nicola Lagioia, Michela Murgia, Andrea Bajani, Sebastiano Nata and Luca Ricci, in order to elaborate motifs, concepts of characters and techniques with which alienated working conditions and forms of consciousness are literarily represented. It is also analyzed if critique of alienation is being practiced in contemporary literature and if the possibilities of overcoming alienation are considered. By examining a novel by Philipp Schönthaler, Cora Rok also takes a look at contemporary German work representations.

The Archive Effect: Found Footage and the Audiovisual Experience of History examines the problems of representation inherent in the appropriation of archival film and video footage for historical purposes. Baron analyses the way in which the meanings of archival documents are modified when they are placed in new texts and contexts, constructing the viewer's experience of and relationship to the past they portray. Rethinking the notion of the archival document in terms of its reception and the spectatorial experiences it generates, she explores the 'archive effect' as it is produced across the genres of documentary, mockumentary, experimental, and fiction films. This engaging work discusses how, for better or for worse, the archive effect is mobilized to create new histories, alternative histories, and misreadings of history. The book covers a multitude of contemporary cultural artefacts including fiction films like Zelig, Forrest Gump and JFK, mockumentaries such as The Blair Witch Project and Forgotten Silver, documentaries like Standard Operating Procedure and Grizzly Man, and videogames like Call of Duty: World at

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War. In addition, she examines the works of many experimental filmmakers including those of Péter Forgács, Adele Horne, Bill Morrison, Cheryl Dunye, and Natalie Bookchin.

Since 1995 there has been a widespread return of commitment to French cinema taking it to a level unmatched since the heady days following 1968. But this new wave of political film is very different and urgently calls out for an analysis that will account for its development, its formal characteristics and its originality. This is what this book provides. It engages with leading directors such as Cantet, Tavernier, Dumont, Kassovitz, Zonca and Guédiguian, takes in a range of less well known but important figures and strays across the Belgian border to engage with the seminal work of the Dardenne brothers. It shows how the works discussed are helping to reinvent political cinema by finding stylistic and narrative strategies adequate to the contemporary context.

During the night between 5th and 6th December 2007 a serious fire invests assembly line 5 of the establishment ThyssenKrupp (Turin, Italy). The families, friends and colleagues of the seven victims recount the tragic circumstances of that night and their lives of survivors. The film gives voice to the and unanswered questions about how this fire could have happened, the pain of victims' relatives and the accusations to the managers of the factory. The film begins with a prologue in black and white in which actors act the parts of the victims' relatives: they remember the moments before the tragedy.

Insieme alla fabbrica, è un mondo intero ad andare in frantumi, con il progressivo e inesorabile sfaldamento di un'identità operaia che aveva nella dimensione collettiva della condivisione e della lotta la sua modalità di espressione privilegiata. e l'affresco corale prende forma attraverso i dettagli puntuali e minuti, potenti e precisi, della storia orale, delle memorie personali, della vita quotidiana, che ci proiettano all'indietro verso il Risorgimento e la formazione della nazione, e al tempo stesso in avanti, verso un futuro globale nebuloso e imperscrutabile.

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responded to a scholarly landscape in which documentary film was largely understudied and undervalued aesthetically, and analyzed instead through issues of ethics, politics, and film technology. Editors Barry Keith Grant and Jeannette Sloniowski addressed this gap by presenting a useful survey of the artistic and persuasive aspects of documentary film from a range of critical viewpoints. This new edition of *Documenting the Documentary* adds five new essays on more recent films in addition to the text of the first edition. Thirty-one film and media scholars, many of them among the most important voices in the area of documentary film, cover the significant developments in the history of documentary filmmaking from *Nanook of the North* (1922), the first commercially released documentary feature, to contemporary independent film and video productions like Werner Herzog's *Grizzly Man* (2005) and the controversial *Borat* (2006). The works discussed also include representative examples of many important national and stylistic movements and various production contexts, from mainstream to avant-garde. In all, this volume offers a series of rich and revealing analyses of those "regimes of truth" that still fascinate filmgoers as much today as they did at the very beginnings of film history. As documentary film and visual media become increasingly important ways for audiences to process news and information, *Documenting the Documentary* continues to be a vital resource to understanding the genre. Students and teachers of film studies and fans of documentary film will appreciate this expanded classic volume.

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
