These characters' loves, their infidelities, their disappointments and their small comforts -- these, Tempest argues, are timeless. Our lives and our choices are no less important than those of history and myth. Bontempelli challenges our view of the world by looking beyond the old ideas to a startling truth, a way of seeing that is an unwavering source of joy and surprise.
