Neither myself nor Brotha Joka Heshima Jinsai consider ourselves to be poets, nor do we proclaim to be mistake free, we have both made mistakes in our life-time, it was our mistakes that helped us to become servants of the oppressed, but our commitment to serve our People and all oppressed People has facilitated the full restoration of our sense of Humanity and Justice, we both have over 40 years of service in the New Afrikan/Black Liberation Movement/Struggle, and being in prison does not automatically negate our sense of Humanity, especially when one is active in serving and protecting the oppressed, which is a testament to our capacity to embrace our Humanity! Brotha Joka Heshima Jinsai served 19 years in Solitary Confinement/Isolation, and I served 32 years in Solitary Confinement/Isolation. A place that was/is designed to break our spirits, destroy our minds, and sabotage all our outside connections, especially our families and Loved-ones, and this is a Government-Sanctioned inhumanity! We are survivors not because we have successfully maintained our sanity, to the contrary, we are survivors because we refused to capitulate our sense of Humanity to the man-made trappings and culture of self-destructive behavior; I tell People, one cannot engage in socially deviant behavior, such as: Racism, Fascism, Sexism, Oppression, Selling Drugs, Harming Innocent People, Torturing Prisoners, just to name a few, and claim to have their sense of Humanity. We as Humans do not define Humanity, nor can Humanity be confined by the laws of a copyright, or dictated to by the evils of man. Humanity defines who we are as individuals as well as the Human race. Humanity/Humanitarian are words that are often thrown around indiscriminately, and the recipients of this accolade, accept this Honor without remonstrance, believing they are deserving of such an Honor. People, you may be wondering what does the above have to do with poetry, or the act of writing poetry. We as New Afrikan Revolutionaries use words as armed weapons in the service of Humanity, making no proclamation of self-perfection, we are just as equally subjected to the temptations of the flesh and materialistic world that which we live, but as Humanity's Soldiers honed from the concrete and steel that attempts to break our spirits, we, while in Solitary Confinement found solace in the knowledge that Humanity and the mercy of the spirit above did not abandon us, but grace us with the strength to endure and resist the forces that have pledged to dehumanize our spirit. Our poetry is a narrative of our battle to serve Humanity and the People, it's our declaration to serve as Martyrs in the name of Humanity, I ask of you, to open up your spirit and take a walk with us on a journey where resistance is our Coat of Arms, and we wear it with a sense of gratitude for those who have paved the way so that we can resist and proclaim our inherent HUMANITY!!!!

NALI By Esther Henry In an era of darkness, mystery, tropical jungles and cannibalism, Nali tries to buck the ancient traditions, only to find herself deeply entrenched in them. As a young girl full of dreams, she is given to a tribal elder in marriage and quickly learns that her girlhood dreams could be shattered overnight. The rain forest held a secret refuge that only Nali knew, where she took her dreams and her delusions. Will she be forced to succumb to a subservient role the rest of her life, or can she overcome the hopelessness that comes with isolation, ignorance and tradition? Deep in the heart of New Guinea lies the village of Mendoka, beautifully camouflaged from the rest of the world. This is a tome of poetry over 350 pages in length, that covers all aspects of life that the bleeding heart of a poet can long to appreciate. Desperation breeds good poetry, and lovesickness breeds desperation, so the lovelorn heart often speaks plainly, and tells stories of the paths we tread.

The poet - picked up the pen at 17 years of age. The pen - traditional poetry was its life source, laid to rest by the poet shortly after reaching adulthood. This small book of poems with much to tell holds poignant vignettes of one woman's life. From the humor and empathy of character studies about people whose lives touched hers to the terror of a nocturnal tornado; from the depth of her love for nature to the life-long love that survived despite wartime separations that often left her to raise four children alone, Thompson heralds the unique joys and struggles of being a woman that embraces all of life.

The texts which comprise this small book - forms of essay, talk, dialogue - at one time saw themselves as individualists who went somewhere (to small press magazines) on their own. Now they are here, collected with the chance of going nowhere together. As it should be: since they represent the fate of language and translation in the memory of aliens living inside America - like a family going nowhere together, but at home. The philosopher Jacques Derrida and his family are part of this family in the dead letter office, and curiously they are named going nowhere together at home. Along the way, so are the poets Charles Reznikoff and William Carlos Williams and Emmanuel Hocquard and Juliette Valery and Charles Olson, as well as Horace's Odes in translation. You will find in this Memoir what it means for an alien to search for his family in a book outside the time of its writing. You will find him discovering that translation is a personal story and that poetry might not have a home without it. You will find him wondering: whose voices are these which we hear around us as we write, as Babel turns to rumor through the fact of translation, wherein a book is being made and remade from American to French and back again? You will find him through translation like a Being in the Poetry of the Extraterritorial,

an un-owned territory which is neither French nor American but is negotiated by the rumor of a poetry which emerges from both, a future condition (État) which seeks the name it could be but is not. Follow this alien Being's trajectory: he is not of America but grows up in it. He publishes a book in French translation before it appears in the American English original. He becomes native to a writing whose eloquence is always in question, at times because it is passive, at other times because it is unpronounceable. Who, over time, finds his Memoir? In the dead letter office, we do. We find someone somewhat like ourselves, who uses language and translation as if these were a poet's gifts in the making of history, a history which is foreign yet integral to his homeland. We find someone who uses it to return to his own people and place, so that he can "only stand more/revealed." We find someone who will act the new basis for his identity - the consciousness whose coming into Being must be premised on his existence in another world.

June, 1968. Twenty-two years old, 5' 11" 155 pounds; red-haired, blue-eyed, fair-skinned, freckled and fresh out of college, I found myself flying out of Logan airport in Boston heading for a two-year stint in the Peace Corps in the Philippines teaching modern mathematics. It was the era of the Vietnam War – Woodstock – the first man landing on the moon. Everything I took as a given was challenged. My pre-conceived ideas of life, community, family and friendship were turned inside out, shaken apart, dismantled and reassembled. I was advantaged and was going to live with those who were less so. First hand in the "third world" was going to be a shocker. "Hey Joe" was a greeting of affection Filipinos had for Americans. Take your siya (chair) at the lamisa (table) as my new panimalay (family) and I enjoy our panyaga (lunch) of kanon (cooked rice), isda (fish), utanon (vegetables), fried saging (banana) and tubig (water). Meet my host Nana Lola. Lakat (walk) down the dalan (street) with me as I join my migas (friends) Manny, Louie and Popeye to drink tuba (fermented coconut milk). And learn how I got my nickname, "Puti Iboy".
