When she awakens, he treats her warmly and comforts her with some of his scientific concoctions but when he attempts to take a portrait of her, the image is blurred save for her birthmark revealing the disgust he has of it.He experiments some more and describes some of the successes to her but as he questions how she is feeling, Georgiana begins to suspect that Aylmer has been experimenting on her the entire time without her knowledge and consent. One day, she follows him into his laboratory, and on seeing her there, Aylmer accuses her of not trusting him and says that having her birthmark in the room will foil his efforts. She professes complete trust in him but demands that he inform her of his experiments. He agrees and reveals that his current experiment is his last attempt to remove the birthmark, and Georgiana vows to take the potion, regardless of any danger it poses to her.

Even if society will never be able to forgive him for his sins. Like a teen *American History X*, S.F. Henson's *Devils Within* is gut-wrenching, thought-provoking, no-holds-barred look at the plague of white supremacy in contemporary American culture that may have you examining your own soul.

Perhaps, Adler suggests, our blood is oil, perhaps our prey is the planet. Perhaps vampires are us. On the southern frontier in the eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries, European men--including traders, soldiers, and government agents--sometimes married Native women. Children of these unions were known by whites as "half-breeds." The Indian societies into which they were born, however, had no corresponding concepts of race or "blood." Moreover, counter to European customs and laws, Native lineage was traced through the mother only. No familial status or rights stemmed from the father. "Mixed Blood" Indians looks at a fascinating array of such birth- and kin-related issues as they were alternately misunderstood and astutely exploited by both Native and European cultures. Theda Perdue discusses the assimilation of non-Indians into Native societies, their descendants' participation in tribal life, and the white cultural assumptions conveyed in the designation "mixed blood." In addition to unions between European men and Native women, Perdue also considers the special cases arising from the presence of white women and African men and women in Indian society. Things rapidly unravel as Ruby convinces Australia that Stanley is in fact a Nazi. He loses his job, his flat, and ends up living in a rooming house. With all that happens to him, it's hard to know whether Stan is a victim of circumstance, or is receiving his karmic desserts. When he eventually goes on a drug fuelled evening of mayhem with Dylan's lunatic flatmate, he learns that Ruby Hamblett isn't the only architect of his downfall, but that treachery is afoot. Will he eventually come out tops, or is everything Stan touches doomed to defeat? And who IS that making those weird calls?
