Photographed in Zimbabwe and Kenya in late 2020, *The Day May Break* is the first part of a global series by acclaimed photographer Nick Brandt, portraying people and animals that have been impacted by environmental degradation and destruction. The people in these photographs were all affected by climate change, displaced by cyclones and years-long droughts.  
Photographed at five sanctuaries, the animals were rescues that can never be rewilded. As a result, it was safe for human strangers to be close to them, photographed so close to them, within the same frame. The fog on location is the unifying visual motif, conveying the sense of an ever-increasing limbo, a once-recognizable world now fading from view. However,

despite their respective losses, these people and animals have survived, and therein lies possibility and hope. Nick Brandt (born 1964) studied film and painting at St Martin's College in London. He turned to photography in 2001 with his trilogy *On This Earth, A Shadow Falls and Across the Ravaged Land*. His more recent books are *Inherit the Dust* (2016) and *This Empty World* (2019). He lives in Southern California.

through the eyes of Solmaz Daryani, a self-taught photographer, who grew up on the lake. Her grandfather ran a lakefront hotel in the tourist port of Sharafkhaneh and her uncles were sailors. She spent her childhood summers with her grandparents on the lake and, less than a decade ago, her grandfather hosted dozens of people every day. It was the disappearing lake and faded childhood memories that induce her to take the camera and start documenting what was left of the largest lake in the Middle East and the second largest salt lake on the planet.

-- Sebastião Salgado En 1970, à 26 ans, Sebastião Salgado se retrouve par hasard pour la première fois avec un appareil photo entre les mains. En regardant



dans le viseur, il a une révélation: brusquement, la vie prend un sens. Dès lors -- même s'il lui a fallu des années de travail acharné avant d'acquérir l'expérience nécessaire pour pouvoir vivre de son travail de photographe -- l'appareil photo devient l'outil par lequel il interagit avec le monde. Salgado, qui a «toujours préféré la palette en clair-obscur des images en noir et blanc» prend quelques photos couleur à ses débuts, avant d'y renoncer définitivement. Élevé dans une ferme au Brésil, Salgado éprouve un amour et un respect profonds pour la nature; il se montre aussi particulièrement sensible à la façon dont les êtres humains sont affectés par les conditions socio-économiques souvent accablantes dans lesquelles ils vivent. Des nombreuses oeuvres que Salgado a réalisées au cours de son admirable carrière, trois projets de longue haleine se démarquent particulièrement: La Main de l'homme (1993) qui illustre le mode de vie bientôt révolu de travailleurs manuels du monde entier, Exodes (2000), témoignage sur l'émigration massive causée par la faim, les catastrophes naturelles, la dégradation de l'environnement et la pression démographique, et ce nouvel opus, GENESIS, résultat d'une expédition épique de 8 ans à la redécouverte des montagnes, déserts et océans, animaux et peuples qui ont jusqu'ici échappé à l'empreinte de la société moderne -- les terres et la vie d'une planète encore préservée. «Près de 46% de la planète semblent encore comme au temps de la Genèse», fait remarquer Salgado. «Nous devons sauvegarder ce qui existe.» Le projet GENESIS, en lien

avec l'Institut Terra créé par Salgado cherchent à montrer la beauté de notre planète, à inverser les dommages qu'on lui a infligés et à la sauvegarder pour les générations futures. Au cours de 30 voyages, à pied, en avion léger, en bateau, en canoë et même en ballon, par une chaleur extrême ou un froid polaire et dans des conditions parfois dangereuses, Salgado a réuni des images qui nous montrent la nature, les peuples indigènes et les animaux dans toute leur splendeur. Maîtrisant le monochrome avec un talent qui rivalise avec celui du virtuose Ansel Adams, Salgado fait entrer la photographie noir et blanc dans une autre dimension; les nuances de tons de ses oeuvres, le contraste entre le clair et l'obscur, évoquent les tableaux de grands maîtres comme Rembrandt et Georges de la Tour. Que découvre-t-on dans GENESIS? Les espèces animales et les volcans des Galápagos; les manchots, les lions de mer, les cormorans et les baleines de l'Antarctique et de l'Atlantique sud; les alligators et les jaguars du Brésil; les lions, les léopards et les éléphants d'Afrique; la tribu isolée des Zoé au fin fond de la jungle amazonienne; le peuple korowai vivant à l'âge de pierre en Papouasie occidentale; les éleveurs de bétail nomades dinka du Soudan; les nomades nènètses et leurs troupeaux de rennes dans le cercle arctique; les communautés mentawai des îles à l'ouest de Sumatra; les icebergs de l'Antarctique; les volcans d'Afrique centrale et de la péninsule du Kamtchatka; les déserts du Sahara; le rio Negro et le rio Juruá en Amazonie; les failles du Grand Canyon; les glaciers de l'Alaska... Après s'être rendu là où personne n'était jamais allé, et avoir consacré tant de

temps, d'énergie et de passion à la réalisation de cet ouvrage, Salgado considère GENESIS comme sa «lettre d'amour à la planète». Contrairement à l'Édition collector limitée, conçue comme un portfolio grand format balayant la planète, cette édition illimitée présente une sélection différente de photographies organisées par zones géographiques en 5 chapitres: Aux confins du Sud, Sanctuaires, Afrique, Terres du Nord et Amazonie et Pantanal. Chacune à sa manière, l'Édition collector et l'édition grand public -- toutes deux conçues et réalisées par Lélia Wanick Salgado -- rendent hommage au projet GENESIS de Salgado, aussi grandiose qu'exceptionnel. Please note that all blank pages in the book were chosen as part of the design by the publisher. A good street photographer must be possessed of many talents: an eye for detail, light, and composition; impeccable timing; a populist or humanitarian outlook; and a tireless ability to constantly shoot, shoot, shoot, shoot and never miss a moment. It is hard enough to find these qualities in trained photographers with the benefit of schooling and mentors and a community of fellow artists and aficionados supporting and rewarding their efforts. It is incredibly rare to find it in someone with no formal training and no network of peers. Yet Vivian Maier is all of these things, a professional nanny, who from the 1950s until the 1990s took over 100,000 photographs worldwide—from France to New York City to Chicago and dozens of other countries—and yet showed the results to no one. The photos are amazing both for the breadth of the work and for the high quality of the humorous, moving, beautiful, and raw images of all facets of city life

in America's post-war golden age. It wasn't until local historian John Maloof purchased a box of Maier's negatives from a Chicago auction house and began collecting and championing her marvelous work just a few years ago that any of it saw the light of day.

That brief meeting led to an even briefer photographic session (90 seconds), during which Andy realised he had discovered his photographic approach: "I cannot remember what I said to provoke the expressions and reactions I had in these 10 frames, but that was it... BOOM! ... my eureka moment. It was like a huge weight was lifted from my shoulders and I knew celebrity portraits were the way for me." Some 30 years later, Andy's unique portrait style - rapidly taken and often face-on - is admired for capturing the charisma of famed sitters

such as Kylie Minogue, Meryl Streep, Harrison Ford and Kirk Douglas. Andy's chatty, quick-fire approach led Paul Newman to nickname him 'One Shot Gotts'. The photographs that Andy creates are naturalistic, eschewing the seductive technological traps of airbrushing and heavy styling. Andy Gotts was awarded an MBE in 2012 for his contribution to photography. This book is published in association with Maddox Gallery, London.
