When her father, the duke, decides to remarry in the hopes of producing an heir to the throne, Jessica must learn to cope with her jealous and evil stepmother, but she flees to London after the situation becomes dangerous.

This thesis analyzes Snow White's feminist representation in Disney's Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs and ABC's Once Upon a Time. Chapter One contrasts the representation of Snow White in the Disney film and Once Upon a Time. I argue that OUAT offers a feminist revision of Snow White, demonstrating a character that has more agency than the Disney version and challenges traditional gender roles. In Chapter 2, I argue that Snow White is cursed in Once Upon a Time to follow stereotypes of the female gender role, similar to Disney's Snow White. Throughout this chapter, I explore the similarities between Disney's Snow White and OUAT's cursed Mary Margaret.

Over a 200-year span, the largely male construction of the eponymous heroine of the "Snow White" fairy tale has changed dramatically. My research project analyzes five specific adaptations of the fairy tale to illustrate this transformation and argues that Snow White's character reflects the cultural context in which she is constructed. Informed by gaze, feminist, and body theories, I track and analyze the Snow White character in the Grimms' 1812 fairy tale "Little Snow-white," Disney's 1937 film adaptation, Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs, Anne Sexton's 1972 poem, "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs," Angela Carter's 1979 short story "The Snow Child," and ABC's 2011 television series Once Upon a Time. I argue that the male-authored Grimm and Disney texts reflect a patriarchal view of women that emphasizes female beauty and subjectivity by constructing Snow White as helpless, passive, and young. In contrast, Sexton and Carter's feminist texts bitterly critique earlier patriarchal constructions by presenting Snow White as a voiceless child-women whose suffering at the hands of their male creators emphasize the horrors of constructing a female body for the pleasure of the patriarchal male gaze. ABC's Once Upon a Time, as a recent, ongoing television series, has had little serious scholarly study, thus providing an opening for my scholarship. I argue that, surprisingly, this post-feminist, male-created Snow White character is an active woman with agency and a strong, yet changing, female body who plays a dynamic role in the unfolding story of Snow White as princess, teacher, wife, vigilante, and mother of the series' female "savior," Emma Swan. Once upon a time, a princess and her stepmother ruled together with all happiness and joy; until the Queen's chronic headaches and mood swings escalate to violence, and Princess Snow White is forced to flee for her life. Snow

White is certain that a dark magic has pushed her once loving stepmother into madness.
