When a young peasant girl is injured while hunting, she meets a strange, magical man who is a member of a despised race - Mujar. At Cardinal Franklin's instigation, the pope abolishes the Eastern Catholic Churches and forms a new religious order, the Order of Christ Crucified. All its members, including the Pope, vow to die in the name of the faith.
